- » Describe Behavior vs. Suicide Gesture/Cry for Help
- » "Diagnosed with" vs. She's a Borderline/Schizophrenic
- » Working with vs. Dealing with Suicidal Patients

#### Suicide in the U.S.

Each year, 12 million adults think seriously about killing themselves

3.5 million make suicide plans

1.4 million make a suicide attempt

In 2019, 47,500 deaths reported

For every 1 death by suicide...

There are 3 hospitalizations...

9 emergency department visits

27 non-medically treated attempts...

and 228 individuals who experience suicidal ideation.

## **ZERO SUICIDE**



### People At Risk For Suicide Are Falling Through the Cracks in Our Health Care System

In the month before their death by suicide:

- Half saw a general practitioner
- 30% saw a mental health professional

In the 60 days before their death by suicide:

10% were seen in an emergency department



## Suicide Care in Behavioral Health Care Settings

- Suicide prevention is a core responsibility for behavioral health care systems
- Many licensed clinicians are not prepared
  - 39% report they don't have the skills to engage and assist those at risk for suicide
  - 44% report they don't have the training

#### What is Zero Suicide?

- A priority of the National Action Alliance for Suicide Prevention
- A goal of the National Strategy for Suicide Prevention
- A project of the Suicide Prevention Resource Center
- A framework for systematic, clinical suicide prevention in behavioral health and health care systems
- A focus on safety and error reduction in healthcare
- A set of best practices and tools for health systems and providers



#### **ELEMENTS**

- 1. Leadership commitment
- 2. <u>Identification</u> -Standardized screening and safety assessment
- 3. <u>Engage</u>-Suicide care management plan
- 4. Workforce development and training
- 5. Effective, evidence-based treatment
- 6. Follow-up during <u>care</u> <u>transitions</u>
- 7. Ongoing <u>quality improvement</u> and data collection



### Safety Planning, Lethal Means

<u>All</u> individuals identified as at risk of suicide should have a safety plan and a lethal means safety conversation.

Collaborative safety planning is becoming standard practice A safety plan should:

- Be brief, in the patient's own words, and easy to read
- Involve family members as full partners
- Include a plan to restrict access to lethal means
- Be updated whenever warranted
- Be in the patient's possession

## Zero Suicide in Colorado

Statewide implementation!

5 Academies since 2016; another in 2022

All Community Mental Health Centers trained

11 currently funded partners (5 CMHCs, 5 hospital systems, 1 FQHC)

Follow-Up after ED discharge

Collaborative Assessment and Management of Suicidality training

Counseling on Access to Lethal Means, Safety Planning

Gatekeeper training for staff

EHR improvements

Monthly Learning Collaboratives

Health Quality Incentive Program (HQIP)
